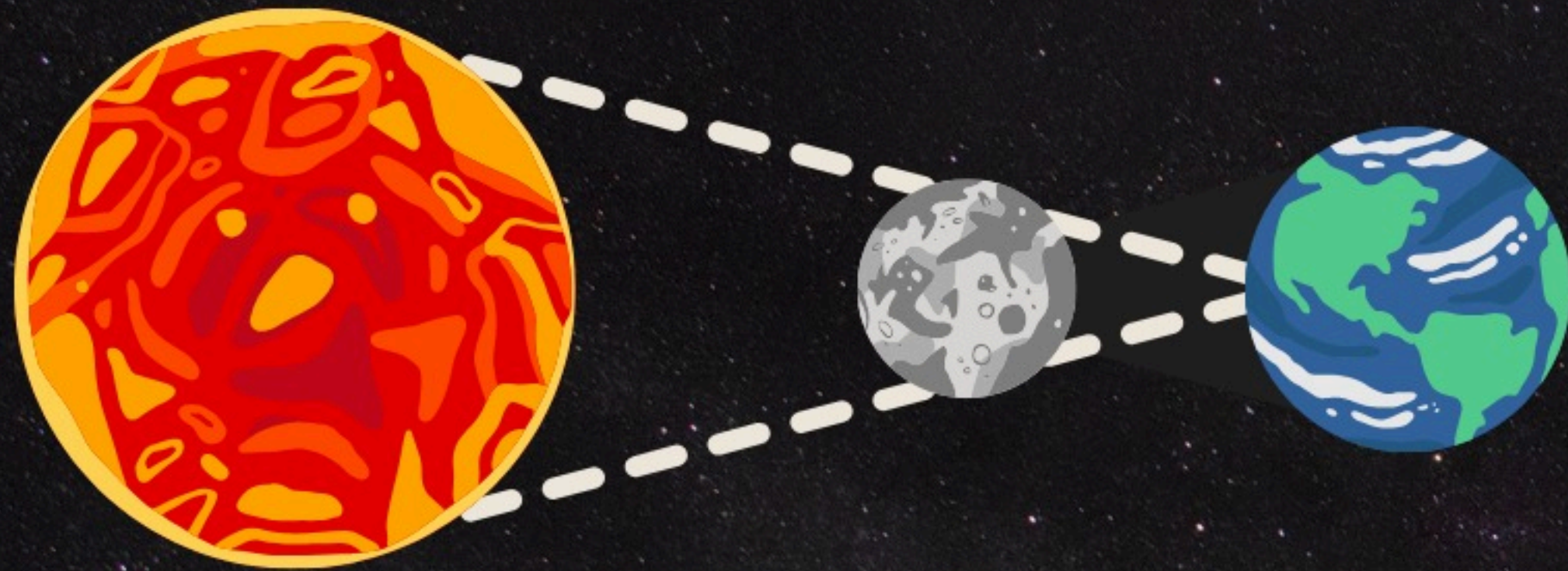

**PARTIAL ECLIPSE ENDS @ 4:25 PM**

### **SAFETY**

- The only safe way to look directly at the uneclipsed or partially eclipsed sun is through special-purpose solar filters, such as “eclipse glasses” or hand-held viewers that meet the ISO 12312-2 international standard.
- Homemade filters or ordinary sunglasses, even very dark ones, are not safe for looking at the sun.
- DO NOT look at the uneclipsed or partially eclipsed sun with the naked eye or through unfiltered camera, telescope, binoculars, or other optical device.

### **THINGS TO CONSIDER**

- Auglaize County expects a significant increase in visitors to the area between Friday, April 5th and Tuesday, April 9th, 2024.
- Traffic will be heavy and lines may be long for local services such as restaurants, gas stations, grocery, and retail stores.
- Schedule important appointments and activities before Friday, April 5th or after Tuesday, April 9th.
- Supplies may be limited due to high demand. If there is something important you need, get it early. This includes gas, groceries, prescriptions, etc.

- With the increased number of visitors, anticipate cellular service may be overwhelmed (primarily Monday, April 8th).
- Know when it is appropriate to call 911. If not a true emergency, use the Auglaize County Sheriff's Office non-emergency number 419-739-6565.

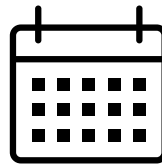

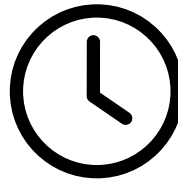

# Solar Eclipse Preparation for Auglaize County Residents



April 8, 2024



Partial eclipse begins @ 1:54 PM

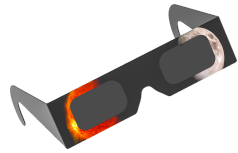
Total eclipse begins @ 3:09 PM

Partial eclipse ends @ 4:25 PM



Auglaize County will experience a total solar eclipse, when the moon passes between the Sun and Earth, on Monday, April 8, 2024 between 1:54pm and 4:25pm. We will be completely in the path of totality for 3 minutes and 56 seconds with maximum totality at 3:09pm.

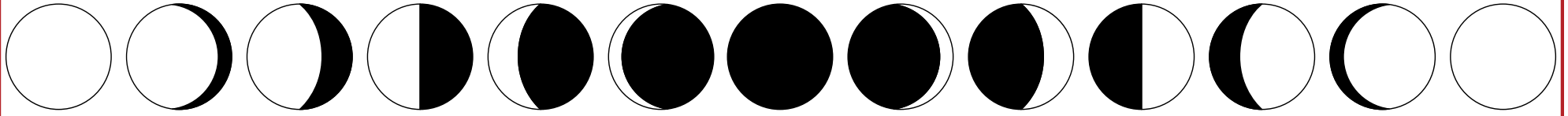
## Safety:



- The only safe way to look directly at the unclipsed or partially eclipsed sun is through special-purpose solar filters, such as “eclipse glasses” or hand-held viewers that meet the ISO 12312-2 international standard.
- Homemade filters or ordinary sunglasses, even very dark ones, are not safe for looking at the sun.
- DO NOT look at the unclipsed or partially eclipsed sun with the naked eye or through unfiltered camera, telescope, binoculars, or other optical device.
- DO NOT look at the sun through an optical device while using eclipse glasses or viewers – the concentrated solar rays will damage the filter and enter your eyes causing serious and potentially permanent injury.

## Things to Consider:

- Auglaize County expects a significant increase in visitors to the area between Friday, April 5th and Tuesday, April 9th 2024.
- Traffic will be heavy and lines may be long for local services such as restaurants, gas stations, grocery, and retail stores.
- Schedule important appointments and activities before Friday, April 5th or after Tuesday, April 9th.
- Check ahead if you have plans for Monday, April 8th; some services may be closed or have limited hours.
- Supplies may be limited due to high demand. If there is something important you need, get it early. This includes gas, groceries, prescriptions, etc.
- Know when it is appropriate to call 911. If not a true emergency, use the Auglaize County Sheriff’s Office non-emergency number 419-739-6565.
- With the increased number of visitors, anticipate cellular service may be overwhelmed (primarily Monday the 8th). Develop a communication plan with family and friends if you lose service.



## **VISITORS**

- 100,000 visitors are expected in Auglaize County.
- High volume of cell phone/Internet connectivity issues
- A large strain on grocery stores, gas stations, Hospitals, and first responders.
- Traffic is expected to be very high along Interstate 75, US Route 33 and city streets. Arrive early and prepare for delays in departure.

### **WHAT TO BRING**

- Cell Phone chargers and battery packs
- First aid / required medication
- Cash at the ready
- Flashlight with extra batteries
- ISO 12312-2 compliant eclipse glasses.

## **RESIDENTS**

- Stock up on food, medicine, bottled water, diapers, etc. to last several days.
- Fill up any gasoline-powered machine as gas prices will increase
- The elevated population will make traveling difficult.
- Refill the propane for your generator or other propane-powered devices.
- Reschedule any medical appointments to days before or after the eclipse.
- Expect roadways and all businesses to either be busy or closed due to the increased population.
- Large crowds will be in several places that should try to be avoided.

## **BUSINESSES**

- With the population of Wapakoneta expected to increase your business may experience more foot traffic and potential sales.
- Supply chain and distribution issues could arise with the expected traffic during the eclipse.
- Safety precautions may be more pivotal as emergency services could be in high demand.
- Adjust schedules for traffic to help employees and delivery times.
- Stock essential supplies in your business to prepare for shortages and emergencies.
- Coordinate with authorities and neighboring businesses to help be prepared for any emergencies.

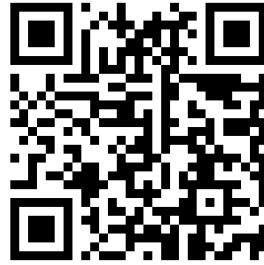

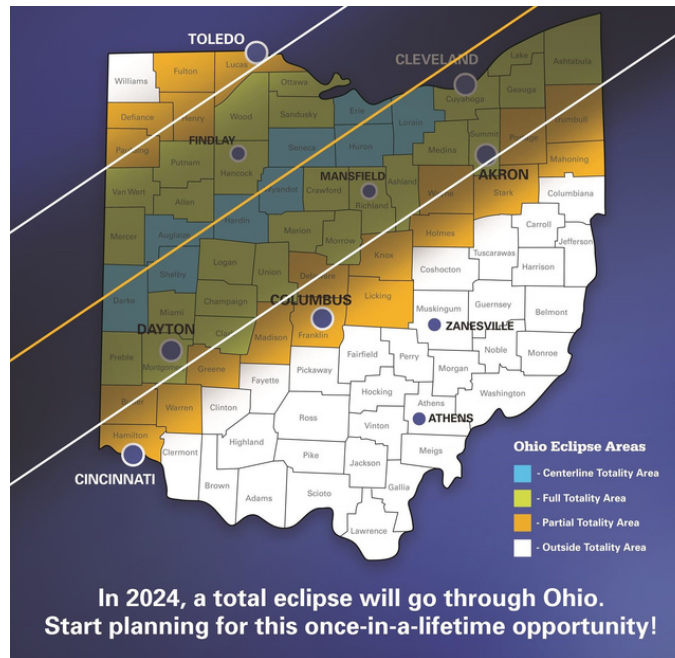
